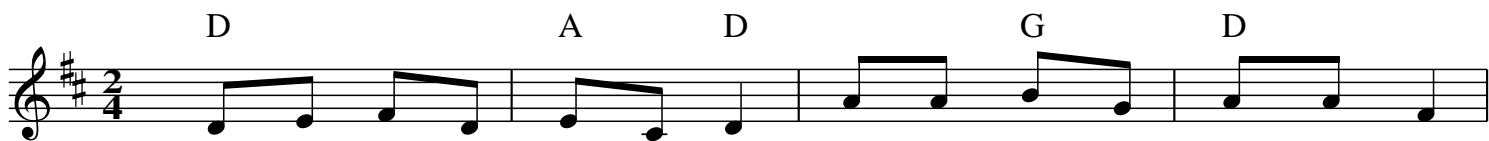


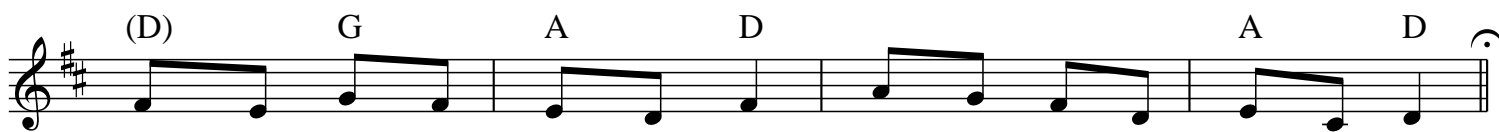
## From the East the Donkey Came Orientis Partibus

 4. Drape him with a cloth of gold; All re - joice who see him pass;

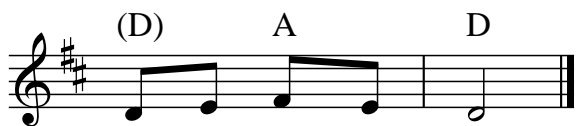


Ears like wings and eyes like flame, Strid - ing in - to Beth - le - hem.
